



hirteen club members enjoyed a three-hour tour of the USS Hornet in Alameda followed by lunch at Pier 29 Waterfront Restaurant & Bar on Saturday, March 19. The group was fortunate to have a very knowledgeable and accommodating tour guide who tailored the tour to the wishes of the group. There were great views of SF and the Bay from the flight deck and the bridge. We also ended up in the middle of a cosplay conference.

The USS Hornet (CVS-12) was the last in a series of ships named the Hornet. This Hornet was launched in 1943 and involved in attacks on the Japanese in the southwestern Pacific including the Battle of the Philippines Sea. She was also involved in the Vietnam war and in the recovery of the Apollo 11 and 12 astronauts when they

returned from the moon. She opened to the public as a museum in Alameda in 1998.

The Hornet was built in Virginia (where all carriers were built) and spent from 1945 until being decommissioned in 1970 operating mostly along the California coast making multiple trips in and out of San Francisco and San Diego.

This Hornet is not the Hornet from which the Doolittle raid was launched. The Doolittle raid was launched in 1942 from CV-8, the previous and only other aircraft carrier named the Hornet.

Rain was predicted so only three 356s braved the weather. Several other members brought their newer Porsches. The 2003 tour of the Hornet (the last time 356CAR visited the Hornet) brought out a lot more 356s. The weather was obviously better, and we were all almost twenty years younger and more mobile. Steve Douglas organized that tour. Admission was \$10 (it is now \$20).

When we arrived on the Hanger Deck, we were surrounded by Star Wars Stormtroopers and more than one hundred others dressed in costumes of their favorite movie or comic book characters. It just happened to be the day the Hornet museum was presenting their third annual CarrierCon, a convention celebrating cosplay, and Star Wars characters were very popular. Our club Events Chair, Barney Speckman, made sure we got some pictures with the Stormtroopers.

Our tour leader was Mike Arrowsmith, a retired Navy lieutenant commander. He was a Navy helicopter pilot and served on the Hornet. He did two tours in Vietnam flying combat search and rescue missions. He made over 400 landings on various ships and was also a flight instructor for two years.

The Hornet is fourteen stories (about 140 feet) tall from the engine room to the bridge and we toured it all from top to bottom. Most of the aircraft are displayed on the Hanger Deck with a couple more on the Flight Deck, but the engine room was of particular interest to many in our group.

It turns out that we have club members associated with the Hornet. Like Mike Arrowsmith, South Bay member Carl Klem served on the Hornet during the Vietnam war. He was in the Navy from 1965 to 1966 and was part of a Helicopter

Antisubmarine (HS-2) squadron that performed Combat Search and Rescue. The squadron's main mission was submarine detection but since there was no submarine threat in Vietnam, they did mostly Air Sea Rescue.

Carl was an Aviation Electrician working as a Flight Deck Troubleshooter. His duties were to fix any preflight or postflight electrical problems with the Sikorsky SH3A helicopters. He got to visit Japan, Hong Kong, Philippine Islands. The Hornet was also part of a convoy that passed through many of the WWII battle areas on its way to Australia (where he had a week off in Sydney).

He and his family visited the Hornet when it first opened as a museum and wound up conducting the flight deck tour because he had first-hand knowledge that the docent did not.

Sacramento member, Lou Fifer, during his long Navy career (twenty-seven years), flew a Sikorsky SH-3D Sea King helicopter similar to the SH-3H on display on the Hornet. Lou made more than one hundred landings on the USS Kitty Hawk and other carriers but not the Hornet.

After three hours on the Hornet, we drove to nearby Pier 29 Waterfront Restaurant & Bar which is within sight of the Hornet for lunch. We had ample parking for our cars, a large room to ourselves and views of the adjacent marina.

he 47th International Porsche 356 Meeting was held in Oosterbeek, Netherlands in May 2022. After the last two years were cancelled, it was amazing to be able to meet up with so many international friends again. About 120 cars (240 participants) registered for the event, and additional members of the Netherlands 356 Club joined us one day. Bruce and I were fortunate to borrow a 356 from some great friends in Bavaria, so we had six days of scenic driving through Germany to and from the event, in addition to the scheduled event activities.

The event began with check in on Thursday afternoon, as we all gathered at the Bilderberg Hotel. Cars were parked by color, resulting in a rainbow of 356's throughout the parking lot. We enjoyed meeting old friends and new over excellent local beer and wine, before the opening night banquet.

On Friday we followed driving instructions for a tour of the local landscape, including along a scenic dike, before arriving at the amazing Porsche Classic Center in nearby Gelderland. The owner gave us a personal tour of the extensive restoration facilities and his collection of vintage Volkswagens and Porsches. He had 5 or 6 of the original Herbie the Love Bugs from the popular movies, along with other Herbie collectables. We had lunch at the Classic

Center, served from old VW buses that had been turned into catering stands. The afternoon included another driving tour, and several hours visiting the Arnhem Open Air Museum. Typical buildings from many different historical periods have been moved to this site and reconstructed to provide a sense of what life was like on farms, and in small towns throughout Dutch history. That evening we feasted on a delicious barbecue back at the hotel.

Dinner that night was at another scenic location, Doorwerth Castle. The dress code was "Flower Power" and there were some great costumes in evidence! We enjoyed a four-course dinner, while listening to music from the '60s, followed by a few very short speeches and dancing afterwards.




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hat started out as a tenuous proposition, turned out to be just what we were all waiting for: a chance to gather together and enjoy our fascination with our vintage 356 Porsches!

Thank all of you for making this memorable event as successful as it was - it will definitely go a long way in supporting future 356CAR events ...














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

The selection of clothing can be found in the L.L. Bean Direct to Business online catalog that is very similar to the main L.L. Bean catalog. Once an item is selected you can work with the sales representative to choose the logo in colors you prefer to create a suitable contrast with the item you have chosen. While your total cost is dependent on the cost of the clothing item plus the cost of



the embroidery, the club has already paid the initial embroidery set up.

To order apparel items first visit the L.L. Bean Direct to Business website at www.LLBeanBusiness.com and select from the online catalog. Then call their account representative at 800.554.4071 and tell her you want to buy an item under the "356 CAR CALIFORNIA ALTA REGION" (Customer No. 7309979974/Design No. 94497). To pay for the item, you will need to provide a credit or debit card and a shipping address.

By the way, orders of 6 or more of the same item in the same color reduce the embroidery cost from \$12 per item to \$5.50 per item. So it pays to get together with a group of friends who wish to order the same items (e.g. hats or jackets of the same color.)
